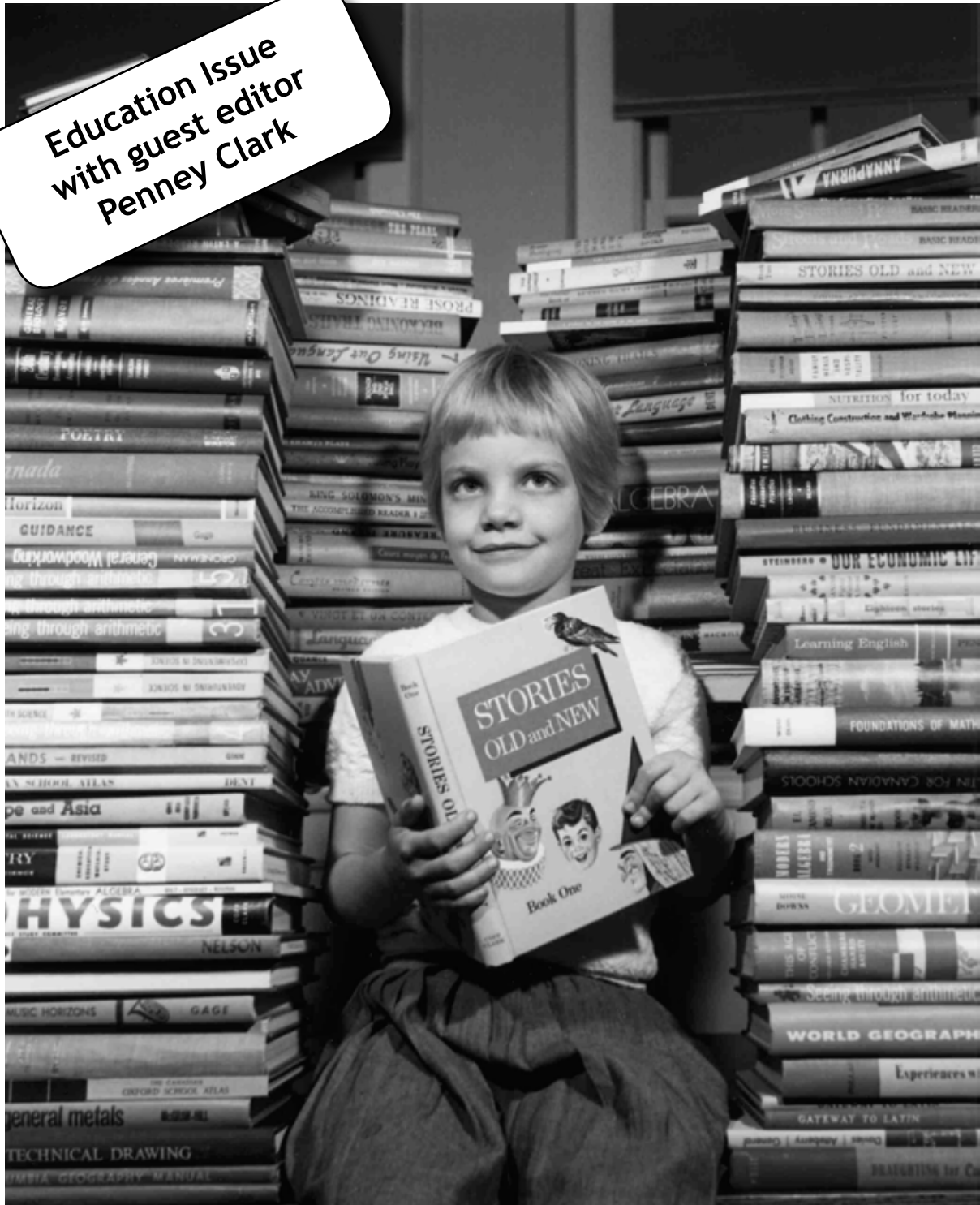

*Penney Clark is an associate professor in the Faculty of Education, University of British Columbia. She is Director of The History Education Network, a national network intended to promote dialogue among the various constituencies involved in history education; Associate Director of the Centre for the Study of Historical Consciousness, UBC, and a board member of the Benchmarks of Historical Thinking Project. A former elementary school teacher, she currently teaches graduate courses in the politics, economics, and history of curriculum.*

*Dr. Clark's history of education articles have appeared in the Journal of Canadian Studies, Canadian Journal of Education, Papers of the Bibliographical Society of Canada, Historical Studies in Education, and History of Education (UK). She contributed pieces on the history of textbook publishing to the History of the Book in Canada (University of Toronto Press, 2005, 2007) project. She is co-author of three Canadian history textbooks used at the junior high school level. Her most recent publication is the edited book, New Possibilities for the Past: Shaping History Education in Canada (UBC Press, 2011).*
